C. Practicing Intentional Generosity [Isaiah 32:8] Planning and a Commitment to Follow-thru

## Isaiah 32:1 [Millennial Kingdom]

Behold, a king will reign in righteousness [contrasting with previous leaders] and princes will rule in justice. [Psalm 72:1-2, 4; Jeremiah 23:5, Isaiah 11:1-4]

## Isaiah 32:2 [Four Hebrew Similes]

[1] <sup>2a</sup> Each will be <u>like</u> a hiding place from the wind,

- [2] <sup>2b</sup> a shelter from the storm, [Isaiah 4:6, 25:4]
- [3] <sup>2c</sup> like streams of water in a dry place,
- [4] <sup>2d</sup> <u>like</u> the shade of a great rock in a weary land. [Isaiah 32:1]

For you have been a stronghold to the poor, a stronghold to the needy in his distress, a shelter from the storm and a shade from the heat; for the breath of the

ruthless is like a storm against a wall, . . . Isaiah 25:4

**Isaiah 32:3-7** Then the eyes of those who see will not be closed [smeared over], and the ears of those who hear will give attention. [Isaiah 29:18]

<sup>4</sup> The heart of the hasty will understand and know, and the tongue of the stammerers will hasten to speak distinctly. [Isaiah 35:6]

<sup>5</sup> The fool [person who constantly rejects God's ways] will no more be called noble, [Isaiah 5:20] nor the scoundrel said to be honorable. <sup>6</sup> For the **fool** speaks folly, and his heart is busy with iniquity, to practice ungodliness, to utter error concerning the Lord, to leave the craving of the hungry unsatisfied, [Isaiah 3:14-15] and to deprive the thirsty of drink. <sup>7</sup> As for the scoundrel [rogues] – his devices [tools] are evil; [Micah 2:1-2] he plans wicked schemes to ruin the poor with lying words, even when the plea of the needy is right.

## Study Questions/Prayer

- [1] Read Isaiah 32:1-2. How do the descriptions of a king reigning in righteousness and the four Hebrew similes (hiding place from the wind, shelter from the storm, streams of water in a dry place, and shade of a great rock in a weary land) illustrate the protective and nurturing qualities of godly generous people? How can we apply these qualities in our own lives to support and care for others?
- [2] Read Isaiah 32:3-7. Read the list of ways our generosity impacts the people around us. How can you incorporate these principles into your daily conversations and interactions with people?
- [3] Make a plan to practice intentional generosity with someone in your life this week. Then commit to follow-through.
- [4] Pray for God to help you practice intentional generosity this week for His glory.

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
